2026 LGFA Taituarā Local Government Excellence Awards

Each year Taituarā — Local Government Professionals Aotearoa hosts the LGFA Taituarā Local Government Excellence Awards. These awards are an opportunity to showcase and celebrate the outstanding individuals and mahi that contribute to the success of the local government sector.

This year’s awards recognise achievement across several categories including the winners in nine Excellence Awards categories, including the prestigious Supreme Award and the Members’ Choice Award. We also celebrate an Emerging Leader recipient, four individuals who will participate in overseas manager exchanges, and a winning Management Challenge team.

2026 LGFA Taituarā Local Government Excellence Awards

The LGFA Supreme Award

Winner

WAIKATO REGIONAL COUNCIL

Pathways to the Sea Strategy – Ngā Rerenga ki te Moana

Pathways to the Sea – Ngā Rerenga ki te Moana is more than an environmental project. It is an example of how local government can bring together innovation, science, mātauranga Māori, partnership and long-term thinking to solve complex challenges and deliver lasting benefits for communities and the environment.

Judges noted: “The high level of national and international interest in this project makes this one of the year’s most transferable entries.”

What began as a challenge unique to Waikato has become a nationally recognised framework that is influencing infrastructure design, informing freshwater management, and supporting councils across Aotearoa to better protect native species and

waterways. Through perseverance, collaboration and a clear vision, Waikato Regional Council has demonstrated leadership that extends well beyond regional boundaries.

Pathways to the Sea is also the winner of the GHD Advisory Award for Environmental Leadership. Further information about the project and what the judges said about it can be found below in the Environment Leadership category.

Note: This award makes Waikato Regional Council the first council to win the award more than once in the modern era (that is since the introduction of the current awards format and an Awards Dinner in 2015).

About the sponsor:

The New Zealand Local Government Funding Agency (LGFA) specialises in financing the New Zealand local government sector, the primary purpose being to provide more efficient funding costs and diversified funding sources for New Zealand local authorities. LGFA was established to raise debt on behalf of the local government sector in a cost-effective manner.

This is the sixth year that the Local Government Funding Agency has sponsored the Supreme Award, and the twelfth year they have supported the Excellence Awards (having previously been a category sponsor).

The Morrison Low Advisory for Excellence in Collaborating for Results

This category highlights the power of partnership, this category recognises collaborations with government, community, or private organisations that deliver strong outcomes for communities. This may include cross-agency initiatives or innovative partnerships that address complex challenges. Entries should demonstrate the value of working together, with outcomes and insights that are transferable to other councils.

TAUPŌ DISTRICT COUNCIL East Urban Lands - Oroko Rise

Taupō District Council partnered with Penny Homes, Classic Builders and Tūwharetoa Settlement Trust to deliver Oroko Rise, an innovative affordable housing project. Together, they embedded affordability into a commercial development without relying on ratepayer subsidy. Stage One has delivered 38 affordable homes, with two-bedroom homes priced from \$550,000 and three-bedroom homes from \$650,000, materially below the district's average house price.

The judges said:

“Housing affordability is a public policy challenge that is not solely confined to the big cities. Oroko Rise has embedded a response to a pressing community need into a fully commercial development. This approach is both readily transferable and scalable. We look forward to hearing more as subsequent stages of this project progress.”

Note: this is the third year in succession that Taupō District Council has been involved in an award-winning entry, either on its own or as one of a consortium of agencies.

About the sponsor:

Morrison Low Advisory is Australasia's trusted advisory firm, specialising in working closely with government and public organisations on unique challenges.

This is the first year that Morrison Low has sponsored a category in the Excellence Awards.

The Eagle Technology Award for Excellence in Community Engagement

This category celebrates initiatives that go beyond expectations to genuinely engage and empower communities, delivering meaningful and lasting results. This includes approaches that build trust, encourage participation, and support inclusive decision-making. Successful entries will show how strong community relationships have led to tangible outcomes, with learnings that can be shared across the sector.

Note: This was the largest category in the awards this year, with 18 entrants.

Winner

NORTHLAND REGIONAL COUNCIL Whirinaki Managed Retreat

In Whirinaki, Te Hikutū Hapū and Northland Regional Council have demonstrated what meaningful community engagement looks like when communities are empowered to lead the decisions that shape their future.

Faced with significant flood risk and the realities of climate change, this partnership has moved beyond consultation to genuine shared leadership, combining mātauranga Māori, technical expertise, and a long-term vision for community wellbeing. The result is a managed retreat programme that prioritises safety, strengthens cultural connections to ancestral whenua, and creates opportunities for future generations.

The judges said:

"This climate adaptation planning process stood out as a project that was community initiated and then jointly led as a partnership between the council and Te Hikutū Hapū in an area that has faced longstanding social and economic inequities. The approach is scalable, and for this reason, and the partnership aspects, we see this as one of the exemplars from across this year's field of entries."

CHRISTCHURCH CITY COUNCIL Coastal Hazards Adaptation Planning with Communities

Through its Coastal Hazards Adaptation Planning programme, Christchurch Council worked alongside residents, mana whenua, technical experts and elected members to develop a community-led adaptation plan for Whakaraupō Lyttelton Harbour and Koukourarata Port Levy.

Over two years, the programme combined technical expertise with innovative and inclusive engagement approaches. The result is a unanimously adopted adaptation plan and a model for community-led climate resilience that will guide future planning across Ōtautahi Christchurch.

The judges said:

“Sixty-five local authorities have a coastline, making coastal hazards one of the most visible and pervasive manifestations of climate change. We commend this project for its thorough project planning, broad, sustained and successful community engagement drawing on psychosocial insights.”

About the sponsor:

Eagle Technology provides IT services and support and is the distributor for global software leader Esri’s ArcGIS platform in New Zealand and the South Pacific.

This is Eagle Technology's first year as an Excellence Awards sponsor though the company has a long history of sponsoring excellence in education and business.

The Co-Lab Award for Excellence in Cost-Effectiveness

This category recognises smart, efficient approaches that achieve better outcomes while reducing costs and maximising value for communities. This includes initiatives that improve processes, optimise resources, or deliver services in more effective ways. Entries should demonstrate clear efficiencies without compromising quality, with practical learnings that others can apply.

AUCKLAND TRANSPORT

Climate Resilience versus Recovery Costs for Transport Networks

Following the severe weather events of 2023, Auckland Transport analysed more than 200 major landslides across its network to compare the cost of prevention with the cost of recovery. The findings were compelling: preventative resilience measures typically cost just 15–30 percent of the expense of repairing damage after a failure.

By challenging traditional rebuild approaches and designing infrastructure that is fit for purpose in a changing climate, Auckland Transport has already identified how \$670 million in resilience investment could avoid between \$2.2 and \$4.4 billion in future recovery costs.

The judges said:

“This entry presents clear and compelling evidence of the cost-effectiveness of investing in prevention and resilience over simply restoring to current standards. It also provided one of the clearest demonstrations of being ingrained in business as usual, particularly the climate adaptation and asset planning.”

Note: Auckland Transport is eligible for these awards as it is a council-controlled organisation. It is the second such organisation to win an excellence award, after the (now disestablished) Eke Pānuku won the environmental leadership category in 2022.

The Excellence Awards celebrate innovation and great stories from across the sector. Our judges did not consider the recent legislative changes to the role of Auckland Transport relevant to their assessment of this entry.

About the sponsor:

Co-Lab is a council-controlled organisation (CCO) owned by 12 councils across Waikato and Bay of Plenty. Their vision is that council collaboration through Co-Lab maximises community outcomes.

To achieve this, Co-Lab has three main functions:

1. Act as an “ideas laboratory” - working with councils to investigate and develop opportunities to work together
2. Deliver shared services to councils
3. Enter joint procurement arrangements

This is the first year Co-Lab have sponsored a category.

The Datascape Award for Excellence in Digital Local Government

This category recognises innovative use of digital and technology solutions that transform services, strengthen democratic participation, and improve outcomes for communities. This includes initiatives that enhance accessibility, streamline processes, or enable better decision-making through data and technology. Entries should demonstrate clear impact, with insights and learnings that can be applied by other local authorities.

TE KAUNIHERA O TE TAIRĀWHITI - GISBORNE DISTRICT COUNCIL Turning the Tide: Large Woody Debris AI-assisted Removal

*Turning the Tide: Large Woody Debris AI-assisted Removal is also the winner of the **2026 Taituarā Member’s Choice Award**. This award was decided by a vote of Taituarā members.*

Following Cyclone Gabrielle, Gisborne District Council faced the enormous challenge of managing large woody debris across rivers and coastlines throughout Tairāwhiti. In response, the Council developed an innovative digital solution that combined AI-assisted aerial imagery, advanced mapping and a bespoke risk assessment framework to identify, prioritise and target areas of greatest risk.

This data-driven approach transformed recovery efforts, enabling faster, safer and more transparent decision-making while supporting the removal of more than 600,000 cubic metres of debris across seven major catchments. By harnessing technology to protect communities, infrastructure and the environment, the project has established a new benchmark for digital innovation in environmental recovery and resilience planning.

The judges said:

“Turning the tide on woody debris brings together a cutting-edge application of artificial intelligence and drone technology, and a robust evidence-based decision-making process. The transformation from a site-based, reactive process to transparent, risk-based one provided us with one of the most compelling ‘before’ and ‘after’ stories this year.”

This is the sixth year that Datacom has sponsored a category in the Excellence Awards.

The GHD Award for Excellence in Environmental Leadership

This category honours initiatives that deliver real environmental benefits and demonstrate leadership in sustainability and responsible environmental management. This includes projects that protect natural resources, reduce environmental impact, or respond to climate challenges. Entries should highlight measurable outcomes and showcase approaches that can be adopted by other local authorities.

WAIKATO REGIONAL COUNCIL

Pathways to the Sea Strategy – Ngā Rerenga ki te Moana

Through Pathways to the Sea – Ngā Rerenga ki te Moana, Waikato Regional Council has transformed how flood management and environmental stewardship can work together.

Built on six years of research and strong partnerships with iwi, scientists, industry and councils across Aotearoa, the programme has developed and tested practical solutions that allow native tuna and other fish species to safely migrate through flood protection infrastructure.

By combining innovation, evidence-based decision-making and a commitment to Te Mana o te Wai, this work is helping restore freshwater ecosystems while creating a model that can be applied throughout New Zealand.

The judges said:

“Pathways to the sea successfully reconciles legacy asset management decisions with today’s environmental and ecological expectations. It is an exemplar in its use of new technology, a meticulous compilation of an evidence base over six years, its successful collaboration with 14 funding partners, and its partnership with iwi.”

About the sponsor:

The Beca Award for Excellence in Placemaking

This category recognises projects and programmes that create vibrant, inclusive places and contribute to stronger local economies, cultures, and community wellbeing. This includes initiatives that enhance public spaces, support local identity, or improve how people experience their communities. Entries should show clear benefits and outcomes, along with learnings that can inspire similar approaches elsewhere.

NEW PLYMOUTH DISTRICT COUNCIL

Destination Kāwaroa

Delivered through a partnership between New Plymouth District Council, Ngāti Te Whiti, the Taranaki Foundation and New Plymouth Partners, the Destination Kāwaroa project has transformed Kāwaroa Park on New Plymouth's foreshore into an intergenerational learning and play space that celebrates the rich cultural, environmental and historical significance of this special coastal location.

Co-designed with mana whenua and shaped by extensive community involvement, Destination Kāwaroa combines play, learning, accessibility and cultural storytelling in a way that is both inclusive and uniquely Taranaki. Since opening in 2025, the space has become a thriving community hub, welcoming up to 2,000 visitors a day and creating lasting connections between people, place and culture.

The judges said:

“Destination Kawaroa reminds us that placemaking puts people at the centre of the planning and design. Broad community engagement has clearly been reflected in the design of this destination playground. This was one of the entries that provided us with one of the clearer demonstrations of overall success, and further, demonstrated how it kept costs down throughout the project.”

The award of highly commended was also given in this category

HOROWHENUA DISTRICT COUNCIL

Building a Sense of Place for Former Refugee Whānau in Horowhenua

In Horowhenua, a partnership between iwi, community organisations, government agencies and Council has helped refugees not only to settle but to truly feel at home. Working alongside former refugee whānau from Colombia and Venezuela, the programme has created meaningful opportunities for connection, participation and

leadership. From Muaūpoko-led house blessings and cultural celebrations, to youth development initiatives and civic participation programmes, the project has strengthened belonging while enriching the social and cultural fabric of the district.

The judges said:

“The last Census showed that more than one in four Kiwis wasn’t born here. Helping support the newest New Zealanders with a sense of belonging while preserving their cultural heritage and life experiences makes for a stronger, richer more cohesive community now and for generations to come.”

About the sponsor:

Beca is one of the Asia-Pacific’s largest independent advisory, design and engineering consultancies. This is the fifth year they have sponsored this category.

Te Tohu Waka Hourua (the Double Canoe) – Buddle Findlay Award for Excellence in Māori – Council Partnerships

This category celebrates meaningful and enduring partnerships with Māori, this category recognises initiatives that demonstrate a strong commitment to working together and applying Te Ao Māori and Te Tiriti principles. Entries may come from any area of council activity but should clearly show how partnerships have been built and sustained, and the outcomes achieved. A strong understanding of kaupapa Māori and shared decision-making will be key.

TE KAUNIHERA O TĀMAKI MAKĀURAU - AUCKLAND COUNCIL Ngāti Whātua Ōrākei Reserves Board – Ko Te Pūkākī: 2040

This project brings Ngāti Whātua Ōrākei and Auckland Council together as equal partners in the stewardship of reserve whenua.

Grounded in tikanga, mātauranga Māori and a shared commitment to future generations, Ko Te Pūkākī: 2040 transforms long-term aspirations into practical action. Through clear governance, dedicated resourcing and iwi-led delivery, the partnership is restoring ecosystems, strengthening cultural connections and creating enduring pathways for whānau participation and leadership.

With plans to plant 66,000 native plants and undertake weed control across more than 50 hectares over the next five years, the programme demonstrates how authentic partnership can deliver measurable outcomes for people, place and the environment.

The judges said:

“This is a long-standing, authentic and effective partnership between local authorities and iwi embeds te Ao Māori and tikanga Māori into the planning and readily repeatable place-based investment and delivery across Tāmaki. This is an approach that can adapted to support partnerships of all types and in any area.”

About the sponsor:

Buddle Findlay is one of New Zealand’s leading commercial and public law firms with a significant local government practice. This is the fifth year that Buddle Findlay have sponsored this category.

Sheffield Emerging Leader of the Year Award

The Sheffield Emerging Leader of the Year Award is presented to an up-and-coming leader with a proven track record of designing and delivering innovative and successful programmes, projects, processes, or practices with an identifiable community impact.

The recipient will travel to the United States to attend the 2026 ICMA Conference in Long Beach, California.

Recipient

Kaanihi Butler-Hare, Temuaki Māori – Chief Māori Officer, Hutt City Council

The judges said:

Kaanihi represents the pinnacle of next-generation bicultural leadership, informed by tikanga, centred on community, and deeply grounded within te ao Māori. Moving between spaces with professionalism, humility, and compassion, his intrinsic application of Māori knowledge systems has delivered transformative, sector-leading successes that resonate deeply across his council, the community, and the wider region.

The judges were blown away by Kaanihi's exceptional record of consistent delivery and profound institutional impact. He was instrumental in a COVID-19 response that achieved some of the highest vaccination rates in the country. Furthermore, he has fundamentally reshaped the strategic landscape of local government by initiating his council's first-ever Māori strategy, revitalising mana whenua MoUs, and establishing a powerful iwi advisory group that brings elected officials, senior staff, and iwi leaders together to change outcomes for all.

Grounded in the wisdom of kaumātua and kuia, Kaanihi views leadership not as a pursuit of personal recognition, but as a collective responsibility handed down through generations. In uplifting Te Tiriti o Waitangi to drive better outcomes for iwi, hapori Māori, and everyone in Te Awa Kairangi ki tai, he exemplifies the exact potential, vision, and heart required of the future leaders of our local government sector. A truly magnificent and deserving winner.

Jessica Papple, Marketing Manager, Palmerston North City Council

In just six years, Jessica has secured three promotions to now lead a team of 15, delivering immense impact for her council and the wider sector. A true driver of economic growth, she has secured major conferences and millions of dollars for the local economy, alongside spearheading a refreshed city branding and an award-winning Summer Water Use campaign.

The judges were impressed by her forward-thinking innovation, including the rollout of AI workflows, and her practical, values-led commitment to te ao Māori.

The judges said:

“Demonstrating dedication far beyond her core responsibilities, she has boosted both staff satisfaction and ratepayer value. She is a powerhouse professional with a bright, long-term career ahead in local government leadership.”

Overseas Manager Exchanges

The Taituarā Overseas Manager Exchange Programme is specifically designed to provide local government managers with a unique opportunity to intensely focus on their management development and career progression within local government through a short, yet incredibly impactful exchange with a partner manager in another country. It's an invaluable experience that broadens horizons, fosters new perspectives, and ultimately strengthens leadership within our councils.

Hononga Indigenous Overseas Manager Exchange to Victoria, Australia

Recipient

Auriole Ruka, Group Manager - Strategic Partnerships and Engagement, Northland Regional Council

Auriole is recognised for her outstanding leadership and commitment to te hapaitia o te ao wāhine, and her enduring commitment to strengthening iwi and hapū partnership in local government.

We were particularly impressed by Auriole's vision for this Indigenous Leadership Exchange. Auriole focused on how such exchanges bring mana to relationships and leadership, reinforcing collective responsibility for change and strengthening the visibility and solidarity of Indigenous leaders. By focusing heavily on reciprocity, Auriole will ensure that isn't just a one-off trip, but the start of an enduring connection between Māori and indigenous Australians.

Auriole's sector-leading mahi in Te Taitokerau has facilitated iwi and hapū contribution to local government in many ways, including the establishment of Te Ruarangi, the development and ongoing implementation of Tāiki ē, and facilitating kaimahi Māori employment and leadership pathways within NRC.

Auriole's wider leadership in Te Taitokerau includes significant work with her iwi and hapū, wāhine Māori in business, and rangatahi through waka ama. She is currently undertaking her Doctorate to explore the leadership of Taitokerau wāhine. Her contributions to workplace diversity have been recognised at the 2026 Diversity Awards as a finalist for inclusive leader of the year. The award of Poumatau Ka Puāwai was also given in this category to acknowledge an impressive future leader.

Poumatau Ka Puāwai

Cassidy Temese, Kaitakawaenga - Iwi Relations Advisor, Ōtorohanga District Council

Cassidy is recognised as a Poumatua Ka Puāwai – a blossoming leader whose courage, authenticity, and commitment are already making a meaningful impact. As an emerging voice and advocate, Cassidy demonstrates strong promise as a navigator for change and a champion for Māori communities, bringing integrity, purpose, and a clear sense of values to their leadership.

This recognition reflects the strength of Cassidy’s leadership potential for the future. They lead authentically as Māori, are building a strong foundation of good practice, and show the kind of promise that will continue to flourish with experience, mentorship, and opportunities to grow their influence. Cassidy stands out as a leader to watch, and this acknowledgement celebrates both what they have already contributed and the exciting pathway ahead.

Civic Financial Services Overseas Manager Exchange to the United States

Recipient

Adele Henderson, Programme Director, Water Services Establishment, Western Bay of Plenty Council

The Judges commended Adele for her exceptional sector leadership, governance expertise, and outstanding contribution to local government at a national level. A Taituarā member since 2013, Adele has given generously to the sector for years, notably chairing the Financial Management Reference Group (FMRG) and the Strategic Finance Forum, alongside serving on the LGFA Shareholder Council and ALGIM.

Currently tackling the massive task of establishing a new water entity, Adele also brings a deeply authentic track record from her frontline work in Cyclone Gabrielle recovery.

The judges said:

“We are certain that Adele will be an exemplary ambassador who will focus on international governance models and sector capability. She is a highly respected driving force in the sector, a true asset to her community, and a thoroughly deserving recipient of this exchange award.”

Overseas Manager Exchange to British Columbia, Canada

Kataraina O'Brien, General Manager, Strategic Engagement, Bay of Plenty Regional Council

The judges commended Kataraina for her exceptional system leadership, cultural depth, and long-standing dedication to the local government sector. A valued Taituarā member since 2011, Kataraina serves as General Manager of Strategic Engagement at Bay of Plenty Regional Council, where she has pioneered sector-leading initiatives by embedding mana whenua partnerships and kaitiakitanga into council governance. Her influence is felt nationally through her extensive voluntary contributions to Taituarā committees, Te Uru Kahika, and sector thought leadership.

The judges said:

“Kataraina brings a depth of experience, and her strategic vision will strengthen enduring relationships between local government professionals in British Columbia and Aotearoa. She is an outstanding leader and a thoroughly deserving recipient of this exchange award.”

AskYourTeam Overseas Manager Exchange to New South Wales, Australia

Anita Reedy-Holthausen, Director Engagement and Māori Partnerships, Te Kaunihera o Te Tairāwhiti, Gisborne District Council

Anita is recognised for her extraordinary leadership, resilience, and unwavering commitment to her community and the wider sector. A dedicated Taituarā member since 2016, Anita played a pivotal role in Gisborne’s Cyclone Gabrielle recovery, steering community engagement and strategic planning through immense regional uncertainty and economic pressure.

The judges said:

“Anita’s frontline experience highlights her ability to navigate complex emergencies while remaining deeply responsive to community nuances and hapū needs. Anita will head to New South Wales where she will bring invaluable, hard-won insights on disaster recovery and long-term resilience to the international stage. She is a powerhouse for her region, a highly respected sector leader, and a thoroughly deserving recipient of this exchange award.”

AskYourTeam Overseas Manager Exchange to Victoria, Australia

Challen Wilson, Te Puutaatara Waka Tairanga Whenua, Communications and Engagement Manager (Specialist Operations), Auckland Council

Working in Co-Governance Communications and Engagement at Auckland Council, Challen has driven sector-leading innovation by developing commercial frameworks for mana whenua and initiatives that help communities thrive. She is deeply culturally grounded, balancing her professional mahi with extensive voluntary contributions to her marae and rūnanga. The Judges commended Challen for her creative, strategic leadership and her exceptional ability to bridge cultural storytelling with economic outcomes.

The judges said:

“Challen will head to Victoria, Australia where she will have a clear focus on First Nations self-determination and partnership models. Armed with a strong communications background and a passion for indigenous economic development, she is uniquely equipped to build enduring cross-cultural connections and bring back invaluable insights to the sector. She is a dynamic, forward-thinking leader and a thoroughly deserving recipient of this exchange award.”

The New Zealand leg of the Management Challenge

The Management Challenge is a professional development opportunity for teams of local government staff to sharpen their leadership skills and dive headfirst into a series of real-world challenges. The winning team will represent Aotearoa at the Australasian finals, competing against the best from across Australia.
